St George's Church, Lupset, Wakefield Annual Report for 2022

Background

St George's PCC has the responsibility of co-operating with the priest-in-charge in promoting, in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic and ecumenical.

Administrative information:

St George's Church is situated on St George's Road Lupset. It is in the Wakefield Episcopal Area of the Diocese of Leeds within the Church of England. The correspondence address is The Vicarage, 23c Broadway, Lupset, Wakefield WF2 8AA. The PCC is a body corporate (PCC Powers Measure1956, Church Representation rules 2019) and a Charity currently exempted from registration with the Charity Commission.

Objectives and Activities

St George's church is a place of hope, refuge and safety for people in Lupset. We strive to live out the Gospel, sharing Jesus' message of love and hope in our community through prayer, worship and action'.

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship in our church and to share in the life of the church community at St George's. The PCC maintains an overview of worship throughout the parish and considers how our services can involve the many groups of people who live within our parish. Our services and worship are our response to God's love for us through Scripture, sacrament, music, and prayer.

When planning our activities for the year we have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and in particular the supplementary guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

In particular we try to enable people in our parish community to live out their faith as part of the parish community through:

- Worship and prayer; learning about the gospel and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in our parish.
- Outreach to those living in our parish and developing our mission to this community and our link parishes abroad.
- Working in close partnership with St George's Community Centre.

Safeguarding: The Parochial Church Council has complied with their duty under Section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline measure 2016 (duty to have due regard to House of Bishops' Guidance on Safeguarding Children and Vulnerable Adults). The safeguarding policies and procedures of St George's Church were amended in May 2019 when the PCC adopted the Diocesan templates for Reporting Serious Incidents to the Diocese and the Charities Commission. In 2020 St George's began to use the national Safeguarding Data Dashboard as required by the Leeds Diocese Parish Safeguarding Board and we are working at level 2. The PCC received three updates during the year. All

PCC members have completed their DBS checks through 'thirty one, eight', the service used by the Leeds Diocese, and completed their 'Fit and proper persons' form as required as trustees under Charity Commission requirements. PCC members continue to update their training and some completed their Domestic Violence training in 2022. During 2022 we received four safeguarding concerns and all were dealt with appropriately. We have started to review the Risk Assessments for church led activities and to provide Role descriptions for the leaders of these groups.

Membership:

The Parochial Church Council is a corporate body established by the Church of England and operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure. Membership of St George's PCC consists of the Priest-in-charge, the Curate, the Church Wardens, the Licenced Readers, three members of Deanery Synod and up to nine members elected by those members of the congregation who are on the Electoral Roll.

Members of the PCC are either ex-officio or elected by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in accordance with the Church Representation Rules.

Committees

The PCC operates through a number of committees which meet between the full PCC meetings.

Standing committee

This is the only committee required by law. It has the power to transact the business of the PCC between meetings subject to any directions given by the council. It comprises the Priest-in-charge, the Churchwardens, the PCC Secretary and the PCC Treasurer. The Standing Committee met once during 2022

Finance Committee

This is incorporated with the Standing Committee and attends to any matters regarding the income and expenditure, budgeting and stewardship of money as directed by the PCC. It did not meet formally in 2022

Premises Committee

This is joint with St George's Lupset Ltd and it deals with issues related to the use and upkeep of the Church and Community Centre and its environs. It comprises the Standing Committee and the managers from the Community Centre. It met twice in 2022 and reviewed the agreement for the use of the Crypt by the Community Centre. This will be reviewed annually in September.

Electoral Roll

The current roll was compiled in February 2019. At the end of 2022 there were 59 persons on the roll. During the year 1 name was added and no names were removed, therefore at the end of December 2022 there were 60 people on the roll. Cynthia Abercrombie

Church attendance:

The usual Sunday attendance was for 2022 averaged at 42 people each week Sunday. Post-Covid some people found returning very difficult due to a variety of health issues and the printed service sheet with readings, hymns and a reflection has been distributed each month.

Report of the Vicar 2022.

We give thanks for all that happened at St George's in 2022. It has been a wonderful year of celebration, events and mission. We had some issues at the start of the year with the Omicron variant of the Covid 19 virus. In spring we were pretty much back to normal and able to resume all our social activities.

In 2021 we looked at re-emergence after the changes made due to Covid-19 and the national lockdowns. Jane Read facilitated a vision morning where she encouraged us to look at the hope of our church and see the heart of God for Lupset. We followed this up at PCC meetings in 2022 and invited the Church family to join us for another day where we prayed together and looked at aspirations for the life of our Church. People contributed to a discussion about the heart of St George's. People described the Church with many different words: "Beacon, Haven, Sanctuary, Patient, Contact, Inclusive, Love, Hope, Welcoming, Flourish, Available, Rest, Tap, Growing, Vibrant, Bold, Loud,

Approachable, Acceptance, Hospitable." We then looked at all our activities and discussed ways in which we could make progress. We affirmed all the good work that people were doing or planning to restart: Face to face home groups, Tuesday drop in lunch, Crafty chat, Bembridge and other home visits, Thursday morning Communion and coffee, Saturday night group, School Work, more worship and singing, Church socials, Monday night Prayer and prayer ministry in services and hoping to do, Alpha, Cap Money and relaunch the Youth work. We also wanted to carry on some opportunities for outside services, Facebook, WhatsApp, the Church website, newsletters and using every opportunity to stay connected and reach outside the Church walls.

Prayer and bible study is a high priority to our Church. Everyone is welcome to join a home group or ask to join an Alpha group. Prayer is always available, just ask! We launched a WhatsApp group in Covid and decided to keep this going. We use the group to share daily prayers, worship songs and bible verses. It is also a place to keep in touch. We also have another group set aside for Church news. We send Sunday readings and prayers to everyone on email and print copies for people who have home visits. I appreciate that Julia, Diane and Juliet have helped me to keep the Facebook page active. Freda and Julia have also done a great job with updating our website.

It was a great joy to go to Cober Hill for the Parish weekend. Unfortunately, the Speaker was ill at short notice. I had one day to prepare the talks. I was still preparing the Sunday session on the Saturday evening (Thank you to the lovely people who sent some chocolate up to my room). I was grateful that Stuart and Diane also helped with this task. We believed that God blessed us all that weekend and gave us time to reflect on our spiritual lives and committing ourselves to deepen our prayer time with God. I thank the Ministry team: Revd Diane, Stuart, Freda, and Pauline and our trainee Reader, Juliet. I thank them for their commitment and energy for working together to serve our Church. Revd Joan Viles is a Retired Priest who has also contributed to the work of our team, we were devastated that her husband Kevin who was Churchwarden and Treasurer at St James tragically died at Easter. He has been a great loss to the Church family. We are also very sad for Revd Joan who is grieving and stepped down from duties for the time being. We keep praying for Joan and the family.

We have continued to use resources and inspiration from the Diocese. We follow the Principles of Leading Your church Into Growth (LYCIG) and use the LYCIG prayer every week. We use Jesus Shaped people (JSP) material, and I invited Revd Gordon Dey to preach again this year and keep us focussed on our aspiration to be Jesus shaped in our mission. We hope to do the best for our church and aspire to be Jesus Centred in our approach to prayer, worship, ministry, and evangelism.

I would like to thank Carolyn for continuing to Coordinate our Prayer ministry team and the church WhatsApp group and the daily prayers along with the worship songs sent by Jane. The daily commitment to prayers, songs, and contributions from the different members of the church family has been a great support for many. I would also like to thank the home group leaders: Juliet, Freda, Pauline & Alan, Mick & Jane along with those who open their homes to host the groups.

I thank Janice and the team for continuing the Messy Church activities. It was brilliant to meet in person again and to give a warm welcome to the families. Janice has also done

a fabulous job of keeping in touch with Messy Church and baptism families in the Messy Church WhatsApp group. I also thank Catherine and Christine for their continued work with Junior Church. They orchestrated another amazing Nativity at Christmas. Thank you to all the Children in our Church family who bring so many blessings. We also welcomed schools into our Church building again and did some school visits. I particularly thank Freda and Diane for their support in this work. We have connections with St George's Centre youth work, nursery, and Uniformed groups. We are always happy to welcome them into Church and support their work. The Cubs packed out Church at their Christingle. Snapethorpe school swelled the numbers at our community Christingle. We love to welcome children and need to keep this priority high in our mission. We had many events throughout the year and the highlights were celebrating with a joint benefice gathering as our Curate, Revd Diane Komorowski was ordained Priest. We had baptisms, including adult baptisms and a confirmation. We were able to have all our Holy week, Easter and Christmas services and celebrations. We went all out to organise a huge Platinum Jubilee celebration fun day for the Queen with lots of wonderful Messy Church

I am grateful for the care they have taken to keep in touch with people. I also thank all those who work with the foodbank and other volunteering jobs at St George's Centre. These groups are a great asset to our Church and part of our vision to become more available and inclusive.

We have started an annual gift day and we were able to celebrate the generosity of our Church family. Thank you to everyone who contributes to the life and ministry of our Church with their financial gifts, time and talents.

Churchwardens' Report 2022

We, as Churchwardens, would like once again to thank Martine and Diane for their support over this year.

Basic church maintenance has been carried out where necessary, but with no major works being undertaken.

The five yearly Quinquennial report, regarding the church buildings, carried out in October 2021, identified various of items that require attention a number of which relate to external areas. It is hoped that these can be addressed over the coming summer months either by an in-house working team or engaging external contractors.

PCC Secretary's review of 2022.

The full PCC met on nine occasions during the year, all meetings were in person and held in the Lady chapel. Eight of the meetings were quorate. The APCM took place on April 2022 when three people were elected to the PCC leaving vacancies for one and two years on the PCC.

As we have emerged from the pandemic we have continued to be aware of the need to maintain care about keeping each other safe as we know that the virus remains in our community but we are confident that our actions are sensible and considerate. Under Revd. Martine's chair the PCC have fulfilled duties beyond their statutory ones and given formal consideration to many aspects of church life including the management of the Church and support of St George's church family.

The PCC is responsible, with the Churchwardens, for ensuring that all issues of Health and Safety, Safeguarding and Data Protection are well managed. St George's Church is up to date with legislation and the requirements of the Bishop of Leeds and Church of England in all these respects.

During the year the PCC have taken the following action on behalf of the whole church:

- In January we received notification that we have become a Joint Benefice with St James' Thornes and Martine became the 'Vicar of Lupset and Thornes'.
- Received reports from the church officers Health and Safety, Environmental,
 Disability, Giving, Copyright and Safeguarding and acted on them as appropriate.
- Dealt with a range of diocesan requirements for safeguarding as outlined in the Safeguarding officer's report.
- Held a Platinum Jubilee celebration, for the Queen's 70th year as monarch, jointly with the Community Centre.
- With support from Pauline Shaw planned and enjoyed a Parish weekend at Cober Hill. When the speaker was ill with Covid we were very grateful to Martine for leading the studies and teaching sessions.
- Considered a request from the Community Centre to extend their building further and consequently researched the relative responsibilities of the Church and Diocese with respect to any agreements that are made.
- Held an 'Outreach Review meeting' on 15th October.
- Continued to support the work of Christians Against Poverty in the Parish and also maintained giving to local and international charities including our link parishes in the Tanzanian diocese of Mara.
- Learned about the possibility of a joint bid to the CofE Strategic Development Fund for youth workers. This would be with St Catherine's and St Helen's. The potential for this bid to be worked through would be with a starting date around September 2023.
- Supported Juliet Taylor as she trains to be a Licenced Lay Minister.
- Were successful in a bid for a digital card reader which we received from the parish but found that the Wi-Fi signal was inadequate for use where the Reader would be placed!
- With Mick Read, the Parish Giving officer, planned a Gift day for November but in the light of national crises, rapid inflation and concerns about personal finances decided to hold this over to April 2023.
- Continued the work on the Architect's Quinquennial report to maintain the premises in good order.
- Maintained the responsibilities of the PCC as a charity under the regulations of the Charity Commission in particular with respect to financial probity.
- Shared a Christmas celebration with the Community Centre which was attended by over 200 children and adults.
- In April were informed that we were unsuccessful in our bid to the FCC community grants for refurbishment of the crypt but will consider alternative plans.
- Completed the new church website (many thanks to Julia Percival) and launched it in September.
- Considered how St George's church might make effective use of some of its finances through potential investment opportunity.

This year has been one of re-opening and new thinking which has brought challenges for everyone but the PCC have continued to work hard and have met to continue to focus on fulfilling their formal role as Trustees of St George's Church. They have worked to maintain the church family in changing circumstances and are grateful to Mick Read for all his continued work as Health and Safety Officer. The PCC are particularly indebted to Revd. Martine as, with support from Revd Diane she has worked to keep the church family together and build it up as it emerges from the pandemic that has had an impact in so many different ways. They would express their great thanks and gratitude to her for all that she and her family have done during this last year to maintain and develop the work and worship of St George's Lupset.

Treasurer's Report 2022

The Church finished the year with a surplus of £9,270 against last year's surplus of £3,771 regarding unrestricted funds.

Planned Giving was, overall, in line with the previous year, and with some additional income. Expenditure, overall, was also in line with the previous year, apart from some ups and downs.

This will leave the Church with cash at the bank of £30,325, of which £19,606 are general funds, £10,719 foodbank funds, with funds on deposit with the CBF of £60,000. I would also like to take this opportunity to remind those members of the congregation who gift aid their giving, to check that they are still paying sufficient income tax to cover the amount reclaimed by the church from the HMRC, if not please let me know. The current recovery rate is 25p for every £1 of giving.

The allotment is busy in the warmer months and generally things are getting back to normal.

At Christmas there was a joint Christmas Fun day with Church and at least 200 hundred people attended enjoying activities in the church and a disco in the Crypt hall.

During 2022 the Prayer team has sadly, shrunk in numbers, this has meant that the remaining members have been very flexible in order to ensure that we have two people available each Sunday, and have occasionally relied on support from Pastoral Carers. Unfortunately, this has meant that some of our "best practice" guidance has not always been followed. This is of concern but not a major issue. Martine, Diane and PCC are aware.

In November (Christ the King Sunday) members of the team were commissioned by PCC and Martine to continue in their ministry.

On a Monday evening we have continued to have an hour of prayer using our STG WhatsApp group as a way of joining together our prayers by adding them to the chat. This seems to have worked well. It does enable people who wouldn't be able to make a physical meeting to contribute their prayers. At some point in 2023 we may try to meet in church once a month.

Foodbank.
